democratization, and environmental challenges.

The Political Science Department at SDSU was founded in 1948 and the graduate M.A. program was added in 1954. We offer undergraduate courses in American politics, comparative politics, international politics, political theory, and public law and public policy.

The Major

Our Political Science major is designed to allow you to pursue a flexible course of study focused on your interests. Preparation for the major involves completing four courses that introduce you to political concepts and help you build your skills in analytical and critical thinking.

The Graduate Program

Our department offers a Master of Arts degree: This twoyear program is academically rigorous and offers a variety of courses that provides a strong foundation in research design, U.S. politics, global politics, comparative and regional politics, and political theory. Our seminar courses cover topics such as religion and politics, international law, immigration and border politics, gender and politics, imperialism, and American democracy.

- POL S 102: Intro to American and California Government and Politics
- Either POL S 103: Intro to Comparative Politics or POL S 104: Intro to Global Politics

Major Requirements - 30 units

You'll complete 30 upper-division units, selecting courses from: One 3-unit course in each of the following five fields:

- Political theory
- American politics
- Comparative politics
- International politics
- Law and public policy

Four additional courses (12 units) in any of these fields

One 3-unit capstone course: a senior thesis, a 500-level capstone seminar, or an internship course

Minor Requirements - 12 Units

You'll complete 12 upper-division units, selecting courses from: Three 3-unit courses in one of the following fields:

- Political theory
- American politics
- Comparative and international politics
- One additional course (3 units) in any of these fields
